




- Sovereignty



Summer 2014 budget estimates

- \$2 billion in captured assets
 - Banks
- \$1-3 million in oil revenue
- ~5% in outside donations
- ~2% from kidnappings
- Artifacts!
- Extortion and Confiscations
- Taxation

Deir az-Zor province (Dec-Jan 2015)

Inflows

• Oil & gas: 27.7%

• Electricity: 3.9%

• Taxes: 23.7%

• Confiscations 44.7%

Outflows

• Bases: 19.8%

• Fighters' salaries 43.6%

• Media 2.8%

• Islamic police 10.4%

• Services Department 17.7%

• Aid: 5.7%

Change in tactics

- People are a revenue resource
- Don't go.
- The Islamic State does not want people to leave.
- Advertise the threats of refugees

Terrorism

Working definition (State Department)

• Terrorism is "premeditated, politically motivated violence perpetrated against non-combatant targets by subnational groups or clandestine agents." - Section 2656f(d) of Title 22 of the United States Code

Definitions

- Terrorist group
 - •1) A group that uses terrorism as a tactic
 - •2) A group that primarily uses terrorism as a tactic

Has terrorism ever succeeded?

- Terrorism has increased over time.
- Depends on how you define the group's goals.
- Terrorists have certainly have had their demands met.





Suicide terrorism


- Strategic act


